Congratulations to Animal Science students Jamie Brockett, Katie D. Smith, and Jodi Torock for receiving College of Agricultural Sciences Alumni Society Internship Awards. Over 100 students competed for internships. Judges were Marianne Fivek, Ken Kephart, and Nelson Loftus. The award winners received \$500 at the Scholarships and Awards Banquet on October 10.

Gabriella Varga, Distinguished Professor of Animal Science, was selected for the second consecutive year as the recipient of the Arthur W. Nesbitt Faculty Program Development Award in the College of Agricultural Sciences. The award represents a \$150,000 commitment by alumnus Nesbitt, who endowed this award to support faculty research, teaching, or extension activities in agribusiness, dairy science or food science. The award also aims to attract additional funding for the selected faculty member's program.

Varga has established an internationally recognized research program in dairy nutrition and has recently been investigating how livestock diets might affect gas emissions from dairy farms.

She has published or co-authored 57 articles in 11 peer-reviewed scientific journals and 61 abstracts. In addition, she has presented 53 invited seminars in five countries and has mentored 23 graduate students. She has been a strong advocate of undergraduate research, mentoring many honor students.

Nesbitt graduated from Penn State in 1950 with a degree in agricultural economics. He has had a long career in the agricultural industry, including serving as chairman, president, chief executive officer and director of Nasco International, a distributor of educational teaching aids, agricultural supplies and laboratory sampling products.

Nesbitt served as a Penn State trustee from 1987 to 1988. A long-time supporter of the university, he also has been a volunteer leader in Penn State fund-raising activities, first for the Snider Agricultural Arena and then for the university's first capital campaign, The Campaign for Penn State. He was named a distinguished alumnus in 1987, and an alumni fellow in the College of Agricultural Sciences in 1979. He currently is CEO of Awnward LLC and resides in Fort Atkinson, Wis.

The 23rd Nittany Lion Fall Classic was held on November 4, at the Snider Agricultural Arena. The sale is comanaged by the Penn State Dairy Science Club and the Pennsylvania Holstein Association. This year's sale included 75 lots with an average of \$2,522, making it the third highest average in the sale's 23years. Sale chair was Doug Sattazahn, Womelsdorf; Assistant Chair was Rachel Ebert, Blairsville. Topping the sale was a red 9/06 Rampage calf from Richard Green selling in absentia. The calf, a daughter of Golden-Oaks Banner Rae-Red-ET, was purchased for \$6,000 by John J. and Daniel J. Park of Brookville. The second high seller was a three-year-old consigned by Jill and Michael Ammon of Lewistown and purchased by Larry Hill of Falconer, NY. A Toystory embryo package consigned by Shoremar Holsteins of St. Thomas, Ontario, Canada and comprising seven #1 embryos from Cityview Aleecia (a granddaughter of Shoremar S Alicia) was purchased by Daniel Albright of Landisburg. The Nittany Lion Fall Classic is one of the club's main events, with committee members working over the summer to select top quality dairy animal consignments from throughout the state. One week prior to the sale the animals are transported to the Snider Agricultural Arena, and club members are responsible for feeding, clipping, milking and preparing the animals for sale day. Members are present around the clock to care for the sale cattle.

Judging Teams

<u>Horse</u> The Penn State Horse Judging Teams competed at the All American Quarter Horse Congress on Wednesday October 11 with two teams: a Senior Collegiate Team and a Junior Collegiate Team, and two individuals in the Junior Collegiate Division.

The Senior team consisted of Morgan Bacher, Stacie Domer, Heather Eckstein, and Tara Snavely. There were 23 teams in the Senior College division and the competition was very stiff. In the end, Penn State finished 8^{th} in halter, 11^{th} in performance, 12^{th} in reasons, and 12^{th} overall. This result was extremely respectable in this difficult competition.

The Junior competitors were Cayce Walter, Callihan Schillaci, Hillary Grube, Elyse Debellis, Lacy Ramiza, Kristina Pry, and Danielle Breese. There were 11 teams in the Junior competition. The Penn State team finished 3rd in Halter, 3rd in Performance, 3rd in Reasons, and 3rd Overall. Additionally, individual team members faired well as shown below:

Cayce Walter – 4th in Halter, 9th in Performance, 4th overall Hillary Grube – 8th in Performance, 8th in Reasons, 10th overall Callihan Schillaci – 8th in Halter, 8th in Reasons, 12th overall Kristina Pry – 11th in Halter

Overall, this group of students did a fine job of representing Penn State at this national contest.

Livestock The 2006 PSU Livestock Judging Team built on their success this past spring winning two of five contests this fall. Team members were Andrew Dice, Kelly Diertrich, Kristy Dietrich, Allison Giraldi, Kevin Stahl, and Jodi Torock. The team won the Eastern National Livestock Juding Contest for the second year in a row. As a team they won Cattle, Swine, and Reasons. Allison Giraldi won Beef, Swine, and Reasons on her way to High Individual Overall. Kevin Stahl and Kelly Dietrich were third and fourth overall, respectively. The team then won the K.I.L.E. contest for the first time since 1991. They won Cattle, Sheep, and Reasons and were second in Swine as a team. Kelly Dietrich won Cattle and Reasons and was second in Swine and Sheep on her way to High Individual Overall. Kristy Dietrich and Jodi Torock were third and fourth overall. The team then traveled to Indiana for the Stockman's Contest to compete. The Stockman's Contest is an individual only contest with no team awards. Allison Giraldi finished in the top ten for Cattle against some tough western competition. The team then competed at the American Royal Contest in Kansas City and the North American International Livestock Expo, the national contest held in Louisville, KY. Competition was again tough but a few team members excelled individually. At the Royal, Kelly Dietrich had a good day in Sheep and Kristy Dietrich in Cattle, both finishing in the upper percentage of contestants in the respective species. At the National Contest, Kristy turned in a great performance against stout competition and finished 13th in Sheep and 20th in Cattle and 28th overall out of 130 contestants. As a team they finished 5th in the Shorthorn cattle division and 14th in Cattle with just under 30 university teams competing.

The Penn State Livestock Judging Team won the Eastern National Livestock Show collegiate judging contest held in Timonium, MD. Team members were Andrew Dice, Kelly Dietrich, Kristy Dietrich, Allison Giraldi, Kevin Stahl, and Jodi Torock. Teams from Ohio State University, Virginia Tech, West Virginia, and Delaware Valley College competed in the contest. The team was high team in Beef, Swine, and Reasons. PSU had four of the top five in Beef and three of the top five in Swine and Reasons. Allison Giraldi won Beef, Swine, and Reasons on her way to

high individual overall in the contest. Kevin Stahl, Kelly Dietrich, Andrew Dice, and Kristy Dietrich finished 3rd, 4th, 7th, and 9th overall, respectively.

The Penn State Livestock Judging Team won the Keystone International Livestock Exposition Intercollegiate Livestock Judging Contest. This was the 50th year anniversary for K.I.L.E. The team won Cattle, Sheep, and Reasons, and was second in Swine. They are the first Penn State team to win the Keystone Contest since 1991. Team members are Andrew Dice, Kelly Dietrich, Kristy Dietrich, Allison Giraldi, Kevin Stahl, and Jodi Torock. Teams from Ohio State University, Virginia Tech, University of Tennessee, West Virginia, and Delaware Valley College competed along with Penn State. Kelly Dietrich was high individual in Cattle and Reasons and 2nd in Swine and Sheep on her way to high individual overall in the contest. Kristy Dietrich was 3rd high individual overall in the contest and 3rd in Reasons. Jodi Torock was 4th high individual overall and 2nd in Cattle. Kevin Stahl was 8th overall and 3rd in Cattle. Andrew Dice and Allison Giraldi were both in the top ten in Sheep and Reasons, respectively.

<u>Dairy</u> Our Louisville dairy judging team (coached by Dale Olver and Daryl Maulfair) was second to Michigan State. They also won the reasons portion of the contest. Individually, Dave Wilson was 6^{th} , Nate Heim was 10^{th} individually and 5^{th} in Reasons, and Charlene Barlieb was 4^{th} in Reasons.

The team took first place at the All American dairy judging contest in Harrisburg. They were also the first place team in Oral Reasons by a healthy margin. Emily Yeiser and Raechel Kilgore were first and second in Reasons, and both in the top 5 overall. Jared Daubert and Brent Schuler also did very well. Thirteen college teams participated in the contest, which also included 4-H and FFA divisions.

Alumni News

Richard Saacke of Blacksburg, Va., has been named a 2006 Dairy Science Distinguished Alumnus by Penn State's College of Agricultural Sciences. A professor emeritus of reproductive physiology at Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University, Saacke has focused his work on the improvement of reproductive efficiency using artificial insemination.

His research has focused on the structure and function of spermatozoa, ova, and the mammary gland. Areas of emphasis have related to optimizing semen preservation and identifying semen traits important to sperm transport in the female, to fertilization and, in more recent years, to embryonic development.

Saacke received the National Association of Animal Breeders Research Award in 1985 and the Physiology Award from Upjohn in 1988. He has also been recognized by the American Veterinary College of Theriogenology as an honorary diplomat (1997), Penn State's College of Agricultural Sciences as a Distinguished Alumnus (1997), and Virginia Tech for excellence in teaching. Saacke, who received his bachelor's degree from Rutgers University, and his master's and doctoral degrees in dairy physiology from Penn State, has enjoyed support throughout his career from his wife and partner, Ann. They are the parents of five children and grandparents of 13.

Eight graduates of Penn State's College of Agricultural Sciences are recipients of 2006 Outstanding Alumni Awards. The awards recognize alumni for their achievements and provide opportunities for recipients to interact with the college's faculty, students and other alumni. Ronald Josephson, professor emeritus in the Department of Exercise and Nutrition Sciences at San Diego State University, earned his bachelor's degree from Penn State in 1964 from what was then the Department of Animal Science and Industry. His research has focused on cow milk and dairy products, goat milk, fish and shellfish, meat products, and medicinal foods. He taught numerous courses in food preparation, food proteins, nutrient analysis and food sensory properties, and served as advisor to hundreds of undergraduate and graduate students.
